Best Practices Trip - 1999 Boston (April 1999)

Randy's notes:

- Boston is a unique city, in that historic preservation is extremely important in its development
- Colleges and tech and bio sciences make Boston a vital, growing, prosperous city
- The Big Dig was an enormous undertaking (again, because of the need to preserve historic theme)
 - o "The **Central Artery/Tunnel Project** (**CA/T**), commonly known as the **Big Dig**, was a megaproject in Boston that rerouted the Central Artery of Interstate 93 (I-93), the chief highway through the heart of the city, into the 1.5mile (2.4 km) tunnel named the Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. Tunnel. The project also included the construction of the Ted Williams Tunnel (extending I-90 to Logan International Airport), the Leonard P. Zakim Bunker Hill Memorial Bridge over the Charles River, and the Rose Kennedy Greenway in the space vacated by the previous I-93 elevated roadway. Initially, the plan was also to include a rail connection between Boston's two major train terminals. Planning began in 1982; the construction work was carried out between 1991 and 2006; and the project concluded on December 31, 2007, when the partnership between the program manager and the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority ended."  - o Cost over-runs were from \$4B to \$16B Paid by all US taxpayers.
 - o Results, however, were wonderful.
- Boston is a high tax/high services city, in a high tax/high services state, with education and healthcare among the best in the United States
- There's a problem with dysfunction among the communities of education/ government/business community-which are the big three, leading economic/civic groupings. There is a lack of trust and not much congeniality, and lots of distrust among the three different "buckets"
 - o Academics are perceived (by the other 2 groups) as arrogant (there are 60 colleges and universities within a 10-mile radius),
 - o Business is perceived (by the other 2 groups) as being greedy

o Government is perceived (by the other 2 groups) as being corrupt, and in fact, there is a long and unfortunate history of lots of corruption in government.

The MassChallenge ("...global network for innovators who are working to solve massive *challenges*. We connect startups, experts, corporations, and communities...", https://masschallenge.org) might help bring the three groups together; now because of the business value of intellectual capital developed at universities, the schools of higher education are driving it.
